## Hot Summer Programming from CAA

Interested in using historical records in the classroom? Do you have records in your collection that would interest students? Join CAA on June 21, 2007 at 4:00PM for a presentation on primary sources in the classroom by Stacy Pomeroy Draper, Curator of the Rensselaer County Historical Society.

The presentation will combine a discussion of the 1862 "Great Fire" educational program developed by the RCHS followed by a walking tour of fire related sites in downtown Troy.

On May 10th 1862 Troy suffered its greatest loss by fire. A spark from a locomotive ignited a covered wood railroad bridge to Center Island, and a strong west wind drove the fire into Troy and by evening 508 buildings had been destroyed and at least 8 persons lost their lives. The financial loss was \$3.9 million dollars.

toys. The Miriam Snow Mathes Historical Children's Literature Collection includes over 10,000 children's books and periodicals published in the 19th century and up to 1960. The central purpose of the Mathes Collection is to provide the texts of works that are generally no longer available in children's library collections today—and to make them available for historical, literary and cultural study and consultation by scholars, students, teachers, librarians and the interested public. The exhibit is available through May during normal hours for the Department of Special Collections & Archives, 9:00 AM - 5:00 PM Monday – Friday.

Over the past few years Bateaux Below, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation that conducts underwater archaeology studies at Lake George, and Pepe Productions, a Queensbury-based multi-media production firm, have collaborated on several projects related to Lake George's submerged colonial history. Underwater archaeologist Joseph W. Zarzynski and digital technology specialist Peter Pepe will give a multi-media presentation on using digital technologies to interpret Lake George's Land Tortoise radeau

### **Saratoga Springs Heritage Day**

**May 20, 2007  
12:00-4:00pm**

The rich history of 19<sup>th</sup> century Saratoga Springs will be celebrated at The Visitor Center, in Congress Park (below) and at the Saratoga Springs History Museum with a variety of performances, demonstrations, and activities; the event is free and open to the public.



Mayor Valerie Keehn will open the event by unveiling a bronze plaque at 262 Broadway, the site of the Convention Hall, which was a presence on Broadway from 1893 until it was destroyed by fire in 1965. Sonny Bonacio and Tom Roohan are co-sponsoring the Convention Hall Plaque, the second in a series of Heritage Plaques to be placed on Broadway. There will be a short reception at The Visitor Center following the plaque ceremony. In honor of Heritage Day and the plaque, a limited edition stamp featuring Convention Hall, complete with a special cancellation envelope and an insert with additional facts about the building, will be on sale at The Visitor Center; the stamp is the second in a series of Heritage Day Collectible Sets.

Heritage Day events will include performances by noted balladeer Linda Russell, Native American tracking lore and stories by Jim Bruchac of the Ndashinna Education Center, and "Punch and Judy," traditional puppet show entertainment by the Punch Bowl Sisters, Dr. Sharon Peck and Debbie Peck Kelleher. There will be a screening of "Historic Views of the Spa City" and several artisans and educators will demonstrate crafts and medicines common during the 1800's, and the role of Saratoga's 77<sup>th</sup> Regiment in the Civil War. The Saratoga Springs History Museum will feature an exhibit of old mineral water bottles on loan from the National Bottle Museum.

Kids of all ages will be encouraged to play games that were popular during the 19<sup>th</sup> century or to practice dance steps of the era under the guidance of Paul Rosenburg of Homespun Occasions. Visitors will have the opportunity to make their own silhouette portraits, take a guided walking tour of some of the Putnam family homesites, visit the Putnam Burying Ground, chat with members of the Victorian Ladies about their elaborate period dress, or chat with Gideon and Doanda Putnam, Saratoga's Founding Father and his wife, who will be eager to share their reactions to the changes in the area since they last lived here.
